Sutherlin, OR **Natural Disaster Emergency Preparation**



Items to have in case of
emergency, resources available,
and contacts for when an
emergency occurs.



Why is it important to be prepared?

Natural disasters can happen any time. You may be at work, home, school, or while you're in the car.

Disasters strike quickly and without warning

Local first responders will arrive, but cannot get to everyone right away.

Early Preparation Saves Time!!

Home supplies should be enough to last for 3 days.

Disaster Supply Kits should contain items you need in the event you have to evacuate.

Disaster Supply Kits should be stored in sturdy, easy to carry containers like backpacks, duffle bags, or covered trash containers.

Have a list of phone numbers for doctors and veterinarians.

Names and numbers of people you can stay with temporarily in case you have to evacuate your home.

Names and numbers of people who can house your animals in case you have to evacuate.

What supplies should you have?

3-day supply of water (one gallon per person per day) and nonperishable foods.

1 change of clothing and footwear per person

1 blanket or sleeping bag per person

In addition:

First aid kit that contains your family's prescription medications.

An extra set of car keys and a credit card, cash, or travelers checks.

Emergency tools, including a battery powered radio, flashlight(s), plenty of batteries.

Listen to a local radio station or television.

A NOAA weather radio station is a 24 hour source of information.



Extra glasses and contact lenses and cleaning solution should be included. Bring sanitation supplies.

Any special items for infants, elderly, or disabled family members. Pack extra pumps or oxygen if they are used.

Have a plan!

Teach family to turn off gas, electrical, and water service to your home.

Identify what supplies you have and what you can do now.

Family documents should be stored in water-tight containers. Keep copies of prescriptions with them.

Smaller Emergency Supply Kits should be kept in the trunk of your car(s). Also include: bungee cords, tarps, cell phone charger, bottled water, glow sticks, electrical repair kit, hose clamps, pocket tool, extra oil and transmission fluids, rags, rope, empty gas can.

Evacuation Routes—Know them!

Know where you can go and have routes planned. Have backup plans in case main roads are closed.

Establish meeting places with family members in case you are not together when the disaster hits.

Test your plans!!

Emergency shelters are commonly set up in churches and schools.

Amateur radio operators can help with communications during a disaster. To be part of the radio operators, see the contacts link.

Early Warning System

Register your cell phone or voice over ip phone to be notified of an emergency: tsunami warnings, emergency evacuations, natural disaster alerts, missing child alerts, hazardous material leaks, neighborhood emergency incidents.
